Singapore International School's Can Tho Campus launched its first annual Christmas Charity Fair on Saturday, December 8th. Proceeds of the events went to Operation Smile.


Children, parents, family and friends were welcomed to school and participated in a wide variety of games and activities. Even Santa Claus visited school to wish everyone a Merry Christmas.



The Great Egg Drop Contest

This was a fun, engaging activity that encouraged hands-on work and out-of-the-box thinking in the areas of science and engineering. Forbidding the use of any battery-powered devices, SIS students were instructed to pair off and collect materials to design a contraption to protect their raw egg when tossed off a roof. Students explored objects in free fall and learned to assess their egg drop contraption at impact. Approximately 30 students participated.

The results were outstanding.





During Round 1 of the contest, which the contraptions were tossed off the roof of the car park (approximately 3 meters high), nearly all of the eggs were well protected. Therefore, it was time for the “elimination round”: the surviving contraptions were to be thrown from the roof of the school – over four stories high.

Many of the students’ project were successful again, demonstrating understanding of physics, materials science, and fluid dynamics. The judges – consisting of the STEM committee – rated the contraptions not only on the success of the apparatuses



protecting the eggs, but on the students’ engineering designs and level of creativity. Third place went to Pichu and Hang (Year 4). Second place went to Alisha (Year 4). The champions of the first annual “Great Egg Drop Contest” went to Bill and Leo (Year 6).



On 23rd October, SIS@Can Tho arranged a field trip for Y4 and Y6 students to visit the Can Tho Green Farm. Students not only learned the process to cultivate vegetables but also to practice these methods. After receiving basic information about organic vegetables from 24/10/2018 to 9/11/2018, students obtained seeds for a plot of land on campus. The preparation of soil was the hardest step in the process: weeding, drying grass, digging soil, drying soil, dozing, scattering, and watering soil. All of these assignments were appropriately distributed by the teachers based on the age and physical ability of students. After soil preparation was completed, students in grades Y1, Y2, Y4, and Y6 began planting

seeds and started cultivation of morning glory. The results were spectacular. Students began harvesting on the afternoon of December 11th. They expressed much enjoyment seeing the outcome of their farming. Future experiential activities tasks in farming for SIS students are being considered in association with the STEM model.




directions with the help of a compass. Students also partook in various games such as "Passing the River." At the end of the overnight event, the students received a certificate by Outward Bound Vietnam.
