Dear Parents,

First, let me say how much all of the teachers and staff missed having students at Singapore International School. The hallways were quiet and lonely without the energy and enthusiasm the students bring here every day. The past few months were challenging for all of us and certainly a learning experience like no other.

Nevertheless it is time to try to get school back into our lives, but we cannot forget virus prevention.

To date, we have not had a confirmed case of the virus amongst our students or family members. That said, we must not be complacent and we must all show the same level of diligence over the coming days, weeks and months to minimize the spread of the COVID-19 virus.

Medical experts and disease professionals have emphasized that maintaining

good hygiene is critical to keeping our school community as healthy as possible.
