Principal's message: No bullies allowed



Dear Parents,

As educators, we are always working extensively to finds way to prevent students from intimidating others. As you may be aware, this type of behavior can happen anywhere to anyone from children to children, children to adults, adults to children and adults to adults. Unfortunately, we are certain we cannot stop people from being rude or cruel 100% of the time, but we should be able to expect students to be kind during their time at school. We should be able to provide an environment that leads to greater learning and a feeling of acceptance. With your help, we can be successful.

Since we opened our doors last August, we have implemented many supports for students within the school. Our students in primary and secondary are aware of the issues of bullying. Character awareness has helped in many, many ways. The students are aware that teachers, including their principal, have an open door policy about this issue: come see us and we'll listen. At our weekly assemblies, students perform about a positive character trait with

further discussion. Overall, students must be aware that if they are put in an uncomfortable situation either as bystander or target, they have our complete attention when we're called. In the future, we will invite speakers come to our school to discuss bullying and/ or character. Our goal is this: any unkindness and disrespect of some students by other students is unacceptable and will be countered by teachers and administrators quickly and effectively.

I'm providing you with this information in the hopes that we can work together to find a solution to maintain the positive learning environment we currently have at SIS. We all hope that when our children are not around us that they have been given the skills to act appropriately; however, they sometimes forget and need a reminder. I encourage each of you to sit down with your child(ren) and discuss with them how to choose kind words, how to follow expectations in other settings and how to be respectful to others and to themselves.

Bullying comes in many forms and can be very hurtful to both the target and the bully. Please talk with your child about the different ways bullying can happen and what to do if they see it. I encourage you to talk with your students on what is appropriate and what is not appropriate in the school setting. It is the responsibility of all of us (parents, children, educators, and community) to teach our children the importance of being kind and considerate to others – regardless of age, color, race, gender, sexual orientation, and religion. These are life skills and in our new age of technology, are greatly needed.

Thank you for your future assistance in discussing this issue with your child and in helping to maintain a positive school environment for everyone.
